ed Lange has been active in the polka industry his entire life. He got his start on drums with his parents' band, The Buckeye Polka Band at age five, and to date, has performed in 34 states, Canada, Mexico, and Europe, in addition to appearing on over 40 polka recordings. In addition to his contributions as a musician, songwriter, and arranger, Ted has served as a polka radio DJ, festival promoter, president of the Ohio Polka Boosters, studio musician, recording engineer and producer, co-producer of the nationally syndicated TV program the "Molly B Polka Party" and co-producer and co-host of a polka radio show on SiriusXM. In 2004 and 2007 he received Grammy nominations for his work on recordings by John Gora & Gorale. Ted has performed in the Warner Brothers films "Welcome to Collinwood" with Toledo PolkaMotion and "The Mule" with Squeezebox where he performed a song he co-wrote. Currently, Ted performs over 100 engagements yearly with his band Squeezebox joined by his wife and musical partner, Mollie B.

Mike is the son of Marie and the late, Richard "Rich" Charney. Rich played accordion with such bands as the Polkaholics, Melody Sounds, and Melody Sounds II, all from Baltimore. Nicknamed the Red Baron, Rich wrote The VIP Room and Dottie's Polka that were recorded as a Medley on Charm City Sound's Third Time's a Charm cd.

Mike grew up watching his Dad perform and later played drums with him at the young age of 13. He sat in with many bands throughout the Baltimore area and at the age of 17, IPA Hall of Famer, Mike Matousek, hired him to replace Mike's brother, Steve Matousek, with The Hylites. A few months

later, the band changed their name from The Hylites to Charm City Sound, thus making Mike Charney one of the original members of Charm City Sound. Mike continues to play drums filling in with touring polka bands when needed and with a regional band called The Local Boyz.

Mike had one goal when he created the page; to once again share those great memories with polka fans by reliving iconic moments with bands like Eddie B, Lil Wally, Happy Louie, Scrubby, and the countless other voices and performances that will never be forgotten. Mike has done an incredible job and the page currently has 1,555 members so if you are on Facebook, and not currently a member, make sure you look up "Vintage Polka Videos" and "like" them. You will not be disappointed by the material Mike posts.

2019 I.P.A. Polka Hall of Fame Inductee **Steve Meisner** Living Category

teve Meisner was born into a musical family on April 17, 1961, in Beloit, Wisconsin, and raised in Whitewater, Wisconsin. He began playing the piano accordion at the age of five, performing soon after on stage with his legendary father, Verne Meisner. Since the age of 16, Steve has earned a living as a full-time musician and has performed with some of the nation's top artists that include Myron Floren, Frank Yankovic, and Joey Miskulin. He has performed nationally from coast to coast including the Kennedy Center and Library of Congress; been featured on tv on TNN's Crook & Chase Show and ABC's In Search of America broadcast; appeared in the motion picture, Chump Change, and recorded 22 albums. Steve's awards include his induction into the Wisconsin Polka Hall of Fame, the National Cleveland-Style Polka Hall of Fame, and the Ironworld Polka Hall of Fame. He was also recognized as the IPA's 2017 and 2018 Favorite International Style Male Vocalist and 2018 Favorite International Style Band.

2019 I.P.A. Polka Hall of Fame Inductee John "Stanky" Stankovic

Pioneer Category

ohn "Stanky" Stankovic was born into a family of coalminers and musicians in Nanticoke, PA, in 1936. He discovered the accordion as a young child and was performing at house weddings by the age of nine. Even though John's first polka band was called the "Tip Toppers", town folks referred to the group as "Stanky and the Coalminers" since most of his musicians came directly from the coal mines on their way to play events. The group adopted the name and grew in popularity as they performed throughout the east coast of the U.S.A. and eventually toured internationally on five continents. Their career highlights included performances at two World's Fairs, the 50th Anniversary of the Korean War at Osan Air Force Base in South Korea, HBO Television, and the recording of over 20 albums. In addition to leading and playing with the band, John conducted many polka dances, bus trips, polka weekends, and trips abroad. He was also the producer of the long-running national TV show, Pennsylvania Polka, that has promoted polka music for the last 35 years and continues to air across the country today.

Blanche Zellmer

A wonderful lady with quite a past, yet never celebrated... until Now.

Blanche Havel Zellmer Born: 1922 Professional music career: 1930-2012 (82 years)

B lanche grew up on a farm near Montgomery, Minnesota, where Czech was her first language, and farm chores were a part of her daily life. She is 97-years-old and proudly going on 98! And I believe she has a ton of life still left in her.

She started playing trumpet professionally, yes professionally, at eight-years-old in 1930!

She joined her school concert band on trumpet and baritone.

When Blanche was in her teens, she started her first band. The name of the band was the "Merry Melodears." Blanche not only played trumpet, but saxophone and clarinet, as well.

The next band she started was called "Blanche and the Waltz Kings." She was the contact person for the band and did all the managing work for the band. Blanche owned the sound equipment, owned the band van, drove the band van, and set up the PA equipment for the band.... all herself starting in the late 1930s/early 1940s. And in addition to playing trumpet, tenor sax, and clarinet, Blanche also played the flugelhorn and cornet with the "Waltz Kings."

The music the band played was all written by Blanche, which meant Blanche transcribed all 300 songs from merely hearing the music sometime in the past, including the "Black Gypsy Waltz," a song she popularized in Minnesota. It is possible that Blanche is responsible for bringing that song to the US for all bands to enjoy playing (no proof of that, but it has been speculated). Blanche wrote the music out for concertina, trumpet, saxophone, and sometimes accordion, too and very legible, I might add. For those that have never seen her concertina music, let me share with you the fact that it is more than a single line of music that a trumpet player would read. It includes the two button numbers that are to be pushed on the right hand, the name is the chord to be played in the left hand, AND instructions whether the player should push the bellows in on a particular note or pull out. It's almost a whole language of it's own. And though she didn't play the concertina, she mastered the art of writing out the music.

The band recorded and LPs were made. I am working on trying to get a hold of her recordings. According to Blanche, relatives have the LPs, and she has her own personal copy of tapes.

She led the women's chorus group, The Czech Singers. It sounds like she was a strict, but very good, leader. In order for a woman to be in the group, she had to sew her own Czech costume. And if that was not one of her skills, she had a find someone else to make it for her.

When Blanche was a little girl, she did not pay attention to the fact that she was the only one doing what she was doing. She was just following the path of her brothers and playing instruments and she claimed to have great passion for it. Blanche did state that she did have difficulties being a woman in what she called a man's world.

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She does not remember ever coming across another female musician that played and lead a band. Not to say these women weren't out there, but they were not in Blanche's circle, and she never had that example to follow.

Blanche was a painter. Her art is currently hanging up in her apartment. She also was a historian and wrote a book on Montgomery, Minnesota, "Montgomery: From the 'Big Woods' to the 'Kolache Capital.'" A few years later, she wrote the second edition of the book.

Also, being a historian, she was able to trace her family back to the 1600s.

If all this is not enough, Blanche also collected many Native American artifacts that she found and hand-picked out of the ground. And she worked as a school bus driver for eleven years.

She changed her own oil in her car until she was 90 years old. (That is even hard to picture!) She played trumpet until she was 95 and only had to end at that time because her lungs could no longer pump out all the air needed to blow a trumpet.

Deceased Category

oger T. Lichwala was born on September 27, 1945, in Indian Orchard, Massachusetts. As a result of his exposure to polka music in his local polish community, he began playing drums at the age of 14. Roger first gained national recognition while playing with the Happy Louie & Julcia Polka Band from 1966-1967. In 1969, he teamed up with Billy Czupta, Carl Hoynoski, Mitch Biskup, Tom Kostek, and Steve Dudas to form The Golden Brass. Immediately, the band was embraced by the polka world for its vibrant double accordion/double trumpet sound and went on to perform at all the major polka venues. In 1972, the band won the IPA's Best Album and Best Single for "Let the Sunshine In", and Best Instrumental Group. Roger then renamed the band The New Brass, which went on to record a series of hit albums culminating with "Roll Out the Barrel" recognized by the IPA as the Best Single and Best Album of 1978. After the band's retirement in 1985, he went on to perform with Happy Louie, Jimmy Sturr, Larry Chesky, and others. He even hosted The Polka Showcase, a weekly radio show on WMUA.

I look forward to returning to the Polonia Banquet Hall in the next fifteen years and seeing what more the hall has to offer.

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



Stephen "Big Steve" Krzeminski

Pioneer Category

orn on June 5, 1945, in Buffalo, New York, Stephen W. Krzeminski was destined to make his mark in polka music. Standing tall at 6 feet, 3 inches by the time he was 16-years-of-age, the charismatic accordionist first led Big Steve's Orchestra and later Big Steve and the Bellares until 1995. For over three and a half decades, Steve toured throughout the U.S. Northeast and Southwest; and performed in Hawaii, Canada, and the Caribbean. His band recorded various albums and singles and was featured on a track of Walter Ostanek's Grammy-Winning "Music and Friends" recording. Big Steve made use of his personality on radio as the host of the "Big Steve Polka Show" heard on various formats on different stations starting in 1960 until his sudden death in 1999 at the young age of 54. He also hosted The Polka Saturday Night cable television show from 1984 - 1986. In 1995, Big Steve was honored by the Buffalo Bisons baseball team as Polish American of the Year, and in 1999 he was recognized as Citizen of the Year in the Music Category by the AMPOL Eagle newspaper.


