The How and Why January is National Polka Month By Keith Stras


After the Holiday season, the music business was typically dormant. Once the lounges, social clubs, associations all had hosted their Holiday and Christmas parties, it was especially slow, plus the fact that in Wisconsin, the winter weather could be a bit treacherous and overwhelming.

So back in 1968, the Wisconsin Orchestra leaders decided to get together and proclaim January as "National Polka Month" to stimulate band engagements and get the fans out during the cold winter months.

The newly formed International Polka Association (IPA) officers had relationships with a number of the bandleaders in the Wisconsin Polka Community including Dick Rogers, Don Peachy, Verne Meisner, and Alvin Styczynski,

iust to name a few. Then IPA President Leon Kozicki contacted them and asked if the IPA could help expand the celebration, to which they agreed. The IPA had thousands of black and hot pink bumper stickers made and had them distributed across the country. These "Do Your Thing, Dance the Polka During January" stickers, complete with the IPA Logo and a silhouette of a dancing couple soon were adorning thousands of concertina & accordion cases and car bumpers across the USA and Canada. The IPA also produced a promotional 33 1/3 recording featuring such personalities as Bobby Vinton, Sig Sakowicz, Bill Cullom, and Lawrence Welk reminding people that January was National Polka Month & Polka Music is Happiness!

The concept of the January Festival of Bands was borrowed from an event that was held at the famous Club 505 in Chicago's Southeast Polka beltway. Former owners Wally & Josephine Mlynarczyk booked 5 bands every week for years. Club 505 featured music on Wednesday, Friday, Saturday, and 2 bands on Sunday (which was broadcast over WJOB radio in Hammond, IN., followed by free sausage & sauerkraut for everyone). The bandleaders got together and wanted to do something to show their appreciation for all the work that Wally & Jo did through the years. So, on New Year's Day nearly a half-century ago, the bands donated one hour of their talents for a Parade of Bands every year. The IPA expanded on this idea by presenting the January Festival of Polka Bands on the third Sunday in January. This event has

been held at many historic venues around Chicagoland over the years such as Personality Lodge West on Archer Ave., VFW on 63rd Street in Summit, International Union of Operating Engineers Hall in Countryside, IL, and Glendora Banquets, where the event continues to be held. Back when the IPA had their building on Kedzie Ave, every Saturday evening in January a polka dance was held and when the building was sold the event was moved to Polonia Banquets and renamed the "Warm-up Dance" the Saturday before the Festival of Bands. Valerie has always supported polka clubs, associations, dances, polka radio shows as well as anything to further the polka cause. Most notably, after World War II, she and her husband Edward were frequently seen polka dancing at Cleveland hot spots: The Metropole, Harmony Ranch and the Ampol Club. It was inevitable that her son Joe, would become involved with polkas as well. In 1955, she bought Joe his first accordion and took him for his weekly lesson at De-Paul Studios. Valerie was always instrumental in trying to further Joe's career. She took him to downtown Cleveland to audition for TV 5's THE GENE CARROL SHOW, which he appeared on and played Eddie Zima's "MEET THE MISSUS" polka. She then wrote to Ray Budzilek and got Joe on Ray's TV show and POLKA VARIETIES. When Joe was fourteen years old, she took him to see his hero Li'l Wally, and Marion Lush at The Aragon ballroom. She even paid for the PA system when Joe started his first polka band back in 1969. Valerie handled Joe's record business while he was in college, and consequently developed friendships with customers like Big Daddy Lackowski, The Polish Kid, Ed Grzyb, Freddie Yarosz, Teresa Zapolska as well as polka fans who would

Chicago bills itself as the largest Polish city outside of Poland with approximately 1,900,000 people of Polish ethnicity in the Chicago metropolitan area. So it's no wonder that polka music has such a strong foundation in Chicago musical history. So much, in fact, that the International Polka Association (https://www.ipapolkas.com/) is based in Chicago with the Polka Hall of Fame and Museum located on Chicago's South Side (4608 S. Archer Avenue).

In describing the Chicago connection, Philip V. Bohlman writes in the *Encyclopedia of Chicago*, "Polka music is the common secular music of Chicago's European ethnic communities. Because of its complex ethnic history and the nationwide presence of several Chicago ethnic groups, Chicago's role as a center for polka has been exceptionally significant throughout the 20th century.

The history of polka in Chicago has unfolded in three distinctive phases: the 1880s until World War I; the period between the World Wars; and the post— World War II era. European immigrants and the confluence of ethnic musical styles in the first phase underwent extensive consolidation during the second, when Chicago became a center for publishing and recording ethnic music and for building large dance halls (e.g., the Trianon and Aragon ballrooms).

"Polish-American musicians dominated the third phase, with the distinctive 'Chicago style' and the growing centralization of national polka institutions in the city. At various points, the music has drawn upon extensive patterns of exchange among musicians from different ethnic groups in Chicago and the Midwest."

What is "Chicago style" polka? Bohlman continues, "it has a distinctive sound and performance practice. Clarinet, trumpet, and the button-box accordion are especially evident in the Chicago sound, and extensive improvisation—playing by ear rather than from arrangements—separates the perfor-

mance practice of Chicago bands from those of other polka centers. Chicago polka musicians further specify their style by singing in ethnic languages, even with mixed texts."

Polish American musicians shaped the core of Chicago style, notably Eddie Zima, Władziu ("Li'l Wally") Jagiello, Marion Lush, and Eddie Blazonczyk. By moving the International Polka Association to Chicago in 1968 and generating competitions, festivals, and conventions, Chicagoans contributed substantially to the growth and revival of the most widespread ethnic popular music in North America in the 1990s.

This Sunday, January 17, the International Polka Association will be holding their 52nd Annual Festival of Polka Bands. Due to the Covid-19 pandemic, it will be a virtual event. The IPA will be streaming over two-and-one-half hours of past video performances featuring bands who have shared their talents with us at the IPA Festival of Bands. Artists included in the presentation are Eddie Blazonczyk's Versatones, D Street Band, Freeze Dried, Marion Lush, Jimmy Killian and Honky Chicago, Chicago's Milwaukee Avenue, Music Company, Keith Stras and Polka Confetti, Stas Bulanda's Average Polka Band, Tony Blazonczyk's New Phaze, Polka Generations, Stas Golonka's Chicago Masters, Brighton Park Connection, Tri City Drive, Windy City Brass, Downtown Sound, Gerry Tarka's Midwest Sounds, IPA Tribute Band, & Ampol Aires.



Let's Explore German Radio - Hank Haller

ank Haller's German Radio program can be heard on station WKTX at 830 AM on Tuesdays from 6-9 p.m. Although most of us are very familiar with Hank and his Ensemble entertaining at various functions in and around the Cleveland area, his radio and TV experience has also coma a long way.

As a young boy, Hank never spoke English until he was in school. His parents were both from Austria-Hungary and from 1935-1940 his family and other relatives lived in a group house on Payne Avenue in Cleveland, and they all spoke German. Once Hank went to school, English became the predominant language in his life but the German love of music was to dominate his busy and colorful future.

In 1952, he joined the Jacob Haller orchestra, and in 1957 when Jake retired, Hank formed the Hank Haller Band. In 1957, Hank married Maryanne Reinhold from Koln, Germany. She became the band vocalist and over the years they have made 102 recordings with at least 500 German songs.

Also in 1957, Hank started 27 years of appearances on the Polka Varieties Show (TV) on Channel 5 with Paul Wilcox as host. During those years there were a couple of times when Paul couldn't make the show and Hank did the interview, introduced the band, and did the commercials. He hosted his own shows when he took the band on the road, to malls and other cit-

ies. He also taped commercials for TV to promote tours to the Caribbean, Hawaii and Europe - running nationwide in the 1970's and 1980's. During the era of Joe and Betty Bauer on WZAK, he started a Saturday noon European Polka

Show which ran from 1963-1966. It was a great experience in doing all the work involved in broadcasting himself, including lining up his own sponsors. His band was recording on Delta International at the time, and since the strong station also included Pennsylvania, Canada, and Northeast Ohio, it was good exposure for his band recordings.



It is with great sadness that we inform you of the passing of our IPA® Advisor, Jerome K Wantroba, Jr. Jerry passed away Monday, January 18th, after a long Illness.

Jerry's family were residents of the McKinley Park neighborhood in Chicago, where so many Polkas stars lived. Jerry's relationship with polkas began as a sponsor on Chicago polka radio.

As his business grew he became increasingly more acquainted with the polka public eventually leading to his involvement with the IPA® when the Hall of Fame® building was on Kedzie Avenue where he spent countless hours donating his time and talents transforming the and kitchen area. When the building was sold and the Hall of Fame® was moved on Archer, once again he was responsible for much of the existing work which

Jerry became an officer of the IPA® in August of 1986 when he was elected as a director from Illinois. In 1995 he was elected as the 1st Vice President and in 1996 he ran for President, a title he held until 1998 and then again from 1999 to 2001. After his term ended in 2001, Jerry ran for Director again and held that title until 2013. 

Lifetime member and bandleader, Ronald Urbanczyk Passes June 29, 1951 - December 16, 2020

Born in Lackawanna,

NY to the late Bronislaus and Adele (Bodziak) Urbanczyk, he graduated from Lackawanna High School in 1969 and also received his Bachelor's After a brief hiatus, Ron resumed performing on from Buffalo State College.

Ron worked in the printing industry at Moore Business Forms for 28 years, ultimately serving as Director of Productivity and Waste Management. He also worked as a Project Manager for Delphi, HSBC Bank, and PCB Piezotronics before retiring in 2015.

Ron was first and foremost a family man, proud of his children and his Polish heritage, he continued many traditions throughout the year. Ron was also an avid sports fan, being a season ticket holder of both the Buffalo Bills and Buffalo Sabres, Ron enjoyed tailgating and attending games for the past 60 years. He also enjoyed going to NASCAR races across the country, and played golf regularly during retirement. Spearheading fundraising events was another passion of Ron's, as he helped start the annual St. John Vianney church Lawn Fete, running it for several years in the 1990's. With this experience, he authored a book in 2001, The Fundraising Guide for Chairpersons.

Polka music was always a part of Ron's life. He began accordion lessons at Ruda's in Lackawanna at the age of 5 and started his first band, The Jesters, at age 15, playing local parties and weddings. In the 1970's, Ron joined The Pole Cats, playing concertina and bass guitar. The Pole Cats performed across New York, Pennsylvania, Ohio and Canada and recorded 2 45's on the TAC Record label, featuring the songs All The Girls Want Me & If I Had A Chance on one, with North Shore Polka & Proud to Be Polish on the other. In 1976, the band recorded at Peppermint Studios and released their only LP - Introducing The Pole Cats on the WAM record label. Also during the 1970s, Ron was involved in

Ron often participated in concertina jam sessions hosted in the Buffalo area. These iams led to the creation of the Buffalo Concertina Club, later known as the Buffalo Concertina All Stars. In 2001, while a member of the Buffalo Concertina All Stars, Ron helped organize a trip to Poland and Germany to play in Rszeszow, Poland (sister city of Buffalo, NY) and at the Concertina and Bandoneon Festival in Chemnitz, Germany, the birthplace of the inventor of the Chemnitzer concertina, Carl Uhlig. This trip piqued Ron's interest in the history of the concertina, and he enjoyed sharing his knowledge about the history and features of the concertina with others.

> A few years later, Ron joined Buffalo's City Side Band, performing mainly in the northeast US. In 2005, Ron wrote the dinner theatre musical, Stas and Stella's Mostly Traditional Polish Wedding, featuring the music and traditions of an old time Polish Wedding ceremony and reception, as celebrated in Western New York in the 1950's, 60's and 70's. Band members and audience mem-

bers made up the bridal party during the show, followed band the playing the traditional Oczepiny (Unveiling) songs, and other polka favor-

The New Direction band performed annually at many local church and town festivals. Ron also helped to run dances with outof-town polka bands, as well as with German, country, and rock bands in the Buffalo area, always trying to share his love of polka music with oth-

ers. When not performing on stage, Ron could often be seen on the dance floor with wife Kathy at festivals and dances throughout the US and Ron also enjoyed travelling, and he was able to perform on trips to Aruba, Curacao, Nassau, St. Thomas, Punta Cana, and St. Maar-

Ron was inducted into the Buffalo Music Hall of Fame in 2011 and the World Concertina Con-

gress Hall of Fame in 2016. Ron also taught several students to play bass guitar and concertina, including his son Brian, and Chase and Logan Stanczewski (great-grandsons of Buffalo concertina legend, Frank "Crazy Fingers" Stanczewski), who have performed at the Pro-Am Jam during the IPA Convention in Buffa-

> lo. Ron was the host of The Buffalo Polka Connection show on 24/7 Polka Heaven and helped to get the weekly Polka Buzz television show off the ground in Western New York. Ron also helped to organize and promote the International Polka Association's Buffalo Festival of Bands along with daughter Lori, and deejayed for the IPA Awards Banquet when the IPA Convention was held in Buffalo, NY.

He is survived by his wife of 44 years, Kathy (Dreja); children Lori and son Brian (Kayla) Urbanczyk; brother Daniel (Judy); brother-in-law of the late Ronald (Ellen) Dreja; and also by nephews and nieces.

With the impact the COV-ID-19 pandemic has had on local businesses, Bogdon said he hopes that bringing this large amount of people into the area for a weekend will give those businesses some sort of boost.

Bringing the festival and convention to Southwestern Pennsylvania is also a way to honor the region's cultural roots, according to Bogdon.

"The majority of what I play is Polish polka, but there's a whole other genre of Slovenian polka," Bogdon said. "Western PA is a melting pot of Polish and Slovenian, really the only other place like that other than Wisconsin.'

Originally from South Hills area of Pitts burgh, Bogdon said his father taught him how to play the accordion in fifth grade, and he's been playing polka ever since.

To this day, Bogdon, 49, travels on the weekends with his band, Polka Country Musicians, to play shows

"A lot of my co-workers, friends and family (who) don't get to travel will finally get to see it," he said.

While there is a cost of admission to the festival Bogdon said the association is a nonprofit organi

"We're not doing this to make money," he said "This is to recognize, celebrate and promote polka.'
