Polonia throughout the world have a special fondness for Christmas, which is evident in the enormous volume and beautiful nature of our Christmas carols. While kolędy like Dzisiaj w Betlejem and Lulajże Jezuniu are much better known and more commonly sung throughout the season, there also exists a whole other realm of Polish Christmas carols.

Pastoralki (in English "Shepherd's Carols") are the folk carols of Poland. Like kolędy, they also tell of the birth of Christ, but their lyrics and melodies are much more informal. A common lyrical theme of pastoralki is the re-imagining of the Nativity as though it were occurring in one's own village – the shepherds of Galilee are portrayed as local shepherds or farmers, and the Mary and Joseph as fellow villagers. By humanizing and localizing the Holy Family and other characters from the Nativity, pastoralki make the story more relatable and understandable to the average person.

The lyrics of pastoralki are sometimes profoundly intimate, as though you yourself are cradling the Christ Child, making Him laugh, or playing music for Him. Other times they can be humorous and playful – such as Joseph chastising a shepherd for how he smells, or for playing his instrument too loudly. While still other pastoralki are almost completely secular, with lyrics about caroling and merrymaking.

The rich tapestry of Polish Christmas music would be incomplete and much less colorful without pastoralki. These are the everyday carols that our grandparents and great-grandparents would have sung throughout the Christmas season. It is my hope that in some small way, this recording will help to revive that musical tradition, and that these songs will bring you the same joy throughout Christmas that they brought our ancestors.

#### 1) I My Też Przychodzim Ubodzy Ludzie (We the Poor Also Worship)

This carol imagines everyday laborers and craftsmen greeting the Newborn and offering Him their wares as gifts. In one particularly prophetic verse, the carpenter gives a cross and the blacksmith gives nails.

#### 2) Wstawszy Pasterz Bardzo Rano (The Shepherds Are Awakened)

After searching for the source of the heavenly light, the shepherds are greeted by angels announcing Christ's birth. They welcome Him by playing bagpipes and flutes.

#### 3) Oto Stajenka (Here is the Stable)

A simple pastoralka with lyrics describing the familiar facets of the Nativity scene, performed in the style of the Sadecki Region of southern Poland.

#### 4) Nie w Betlejem, Galilei (Not in Bethlehem of Galilee)

A beautiful pastoralka that re-imagines the Nativity unfolding "not in Bethlehem... but in Poland," with the Holy Family as fellow villagers. Mary is at the spinning wheel, Joseph is farming the fields, and the Wise Men are village officials.

#### 5) Wesoło Jest Nam Dzisiaj Nowina (We Have Good News Today)

A carol rejoicing in the birth of the Lord, and making a plea to the Infant that there be love in the world.

#### 6) Przyskoczę Ja Do Tej Szopy (I'll Jump for the Lord)

Like many pastoralki, this carol humanizes the characters in the Nativity, with the singer describing how he jumps and dances to make the Infant Jesus laugh and smile.

#### 7) Zapłonęła Gwiazda (The Star Shined)

A carol written during WWII by monks in the Mazowieckie Region that tells of the Star of Bethlehem.

#### 8) Jakaż To Gwiazda (What a Star)

A poetic recounting of the Magi and the Star of Bethlehem, written in the 19th century by priest and composer, Zygmunt Odelgiewicz.

#### 9) My Też Pastuszkowie (We the Shepherds)

A more common pastoralka that tells of the shepherds hailing the Newborn. Each verse introduces a new shepherd and the instrument he plays for the Lord.

#### 10) Szczęśliwa Kolebko (Happy is the Cradle)

The poetic lyrics of this carol address the humble manger itself, and how fortunate it is to hold the Infant Jesus.

#### 11) Kiej Maryja Wędrowała (Mary Wandered Afar)

A pastoralka from the Podolia region that re-imagines the Holy Family's search for shelter as occurring in the nearby countryside. Mary's wandering is ended when a kind-hearted peasant offers her his shed.

#### 12) Witajże Dzieciątko z Panny Narodzone (Welcome the Child Born of a Virgin)

All of creation praises the Newborn - the birds of the air, the insects on the ground, the animals in the woods, the cattle in the field, kings and monarchs, and all mankind.

#### 13) Nie Masz Ci, Nie Masz (The Star Leads Me)

A carol sung in the first-person narrative style, in which the singer describes personally lining the crib for the Infant Jesus, keeping watch over Him, and lulling Him to sleep.

#### 14) Nowy Rok Bieży (The New Year Rushes)

A carol with lyrics dating to the 17<sup>th</sup> century. Each verse describes the Nativity with a question-andanswer format: A kto kto? A gdzie gdzie? A co co? (Who? Where? What?)

Tracks 3 and 14 feature the trumpet, a staple instrument in the folk bands of the Kraków and Sądecki regions, from which these two songs originate.

Track 11 features the cimbalom (Polish: cymbaly), a type of dulcimer more common in other parts of Eastern Europe, but often present in folk bands from southeastern Poland. This song comes from the Podolia region, which is today part of Ukraine.

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



I consider it an honor and a privilege to take on this role.


















# The Polka World mourns the loss of **Happy Louie**

She finally turned her baby blue eyes towards her mother and asked who the man was? The mother explained to her little girl that they were watching Happy Louie. It took the child a few minutes before she turned back to her mother with wonder and asked, "Mommy, why is Happy Louie and his musicians recorded three Louie so Happy?"

Whether it was his voice that reminded you of a crystal-clear mountain lake; or his melodies that were instantly recognizable; or his musical lifts at the end of each song as if presents to lift your spirits; or that smile that could be heard in his singing; Happy Louie was the consummate entertainer for generations and will be to come.

Louie's musical career started at a very young Louie. age. He was born August 4, 1934, in Ware, Massachusetts, to Mary (Kmon) Dusseault and Louis G. Dusseault. At the age of nine, he played his first note on a Bugle and then changed to a Bflat Trumpet. Happy Louie attended St. Mary's Polish Grammar School in Ware, where he was Happy Louie, Julcia, and the band toured extentaught to write and speak the Polish language.


